

Good Ole Country

Track by David Wallimann | Key of A

This track features an intro, an A section, a B section, and an outro.

The intro section establishes the A major tonality by applying the tonic A chord and a chromatic walk up to the V7 chord, E7.

The A section is loosely based around the 12 bar blues progression. This progression features the I, IV, and V chords in the key of A. The duration of each chord is increased in comparison to the standard 12 bar blues form. A breakdown of the chord changes in this section is listed below. Notice how each repetition of the A section is slightly different.

The B section modulates to the key of G major. Once again, the progression in this section is loosely based on the blues form. A breakdown of the chord changes in this section are listed below.

The outro features a vamp on the tonic A major chord. A dark E7(b9) voicing is played by the pianist to signal the end of the tune.
